## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT, GORDON WYSE

My wife Mary joined LIR before I did, in 2009. She had joined the French Conversation Group and was looking forward to a seminar on Women Ahead of Their Time. I had recently retired from UMass. I was interested in LIR but still adjusting to my new retired status. Then Mary was invited to a new members' luncheon and brought me along as a guest. ## THE SCIENCE ROUND TABLE MEETS IN A NEW LOCATION

The Science Round Table for Oct. 20 will take place from 2:00pm to 3:30pm at the new Hitchcock Center for the Environment on Rt. 116 in Amherst. The driveway up to the Center is approximately one quarter mile north of the main entrance to Hampshire College. (Look for the Yellow Mailbox with the Purple Spots). Parking is limited, so carpooling is encouraged. We will meet in this new location in November and December as well. We are excited to be hosted by this new, environmentally state-of-art facility.

The Oct. 20 program will be a non-technical description of the recent, first-ever detection of **Gravitational Waves, predicted by Einstein one hundred years ago but never observed directly until now.** John Armstrong will describe this exciting new type of astronomy, introduce the mind-bending concepts which underlie gravitational waves, and briefly outline the amazing instrumentation which permits the new observations.

## TECH TIPS FROM THE TECH COMMITTEE

### **Getting Rid of Unwanted Emails**

Several LIR members have asked for advice about getting rid of the unwanted emails that tend to pile up after you've visited a site or ordered something online and have unwittingly also agreed to receive the company's emails. The following advice is a heavily edited summary from a blog by Matthew Rosenquist of McAfee Labs:

Rule #1: If you are confident that the message is from a legitimate company, use the unsubscribe option. Typically it's located at the bottom of the message and is in small type. Before clicking on it, make sure the link points to a domain associated with the purported sender when you hover over the link with your cursor.

Rule #2: If you are at all suspicious about the sender, do not unsubscribe, just delete. If your mail service supports it, set up a block or spam rule to automatically delete future messages from these organizations. (Check your email program's Help for instructions.) Be very careful: If the message is seriously malicious, the "unsubscribe" link may take you to a site configured to infect your system. If the message is semi-malicious, then clicking the "unsubscribe" link tells them this is a valid email address. They will sell that email address as "validated" to others. Result: more spam

Rule #3: Some solicitations don't offer any unsubscribe option. Just delete.

Remember, if you are not sure any email is legitimate, do not open or click anything, and NEVER open any attachments, including PDFs, Office documents, HTML files, or any executables because they can be used by attackers to deliver Trojans to infect your system with malware, ransomware, or other remote manipulation tools.

The goal of the Campaign, begun in September, 2015, is to raise, over a three-year period, \$200,000 for the 5CLIR Investment Fund and \$50,000 to support our budget until this goal is reached. As of September 1, 2016 we have raised over \$200,000 in actual gifts and gift intentions. Over \$140,000 is already “in the bank.”

- Have funds available to pay occasional rental costs for the spaces we need; and
- Help to keep our fees as low as possible to keep us open to a wide variety of retirees.


So far 43% of our membership has participated. We hope we can get this up this Year. Let’s finish by December 31, 2016!!!!

### **The Misery of User Licenses: How End User Licenses Take Away Your Rights**

Using a website involves becoming legally bound to the requirements of a so-called end user license agreement, whether you know you are becoming bound or not. Many people think "standard agreements" are innocuous and fair. They are not. Learn how these agreements impair your legal rights and in some cases expose you to significant legal risk.

### **"Proofiness"**

Proofiness is the art of using bogus mathematical arguments and facts "to prove something that you know in your heart is true—even when it's not." Political polls and graphs are the leading cause of proofiness in modern society, according to Charles Seife, author of the book *Proofiness*. All measures are imperfect, but some are more imperfect than others. Highlighted in this PowerPoint presentation will be: examples in advertising, medical claims, the 65,000,038-year-old dinosaur, fabricated Potemkin numbers devoid of meaning, and our human need to link every effect with a cause.

### **Gospel Books**

In the early years of the Christian era gospel books were produced in the scriptoria of monasteries. Some of the Irish gospel books were enhanced with marvelous Celtic illustrations. This presentation will feature the Book of Durrow, the Lindisfarne Gospel, and the Book of Kells.

### **The Graphic Novel**

The term "graphic novel" first emerged in an essay in a comics fanzine in 1964, and is applied broadly to include fiction, non-fiction, and anthologized work. Graphic novels gained widespread popularity with the 1986 publication of Art Spiegelman's *Maus*; this graphic memoir won a Pulitzer Prize in 1992. Through this presentation we will trace the history of the graphic novel from wordless novels to the development of counterculture comix. We will look closely at contemporary graphic memoirs and discuss how they convey meaning through a careful integration of illustration and text.

## **A System's Perspective On the Western Mass Community Mental Health System**

This past spring, I used a system's perspective to reexamine both the successes and failures of the community mental health system in western Mass. That perspective helped me understand how the system went from being a model for the nation, closing deteriorating state institutions but ensuring that everyone had well-funded services in the community, to its status today where far too many people with chronic mental illness are either locked up in prisons or are homeless.

## **The Electoral System**

The topic of the seminar was broken systems. Would our electoral system qualify? Did you know that the national popular vote has no legal or factual significance for the outcome of the presidential election? Or that just eleven states can determine who is elected president? The founders created the Electoral College – before there were political parties, airplanes, or tweets – as part of the U.S. Constitution. Fortunately, they also included a way to revise their plan. We will explore how the Electoral College works this election year and proposals to modify it.

## **Gerrymandering**

“Redistricting/Gerrymander” from the seminar, 2016 Primary and Caucus Season, looks at the concern raised especially in the election of 2012 when the Democrats – in House races across the country – won 1.4 million more votes than the Republicans, but won only 46% of the House seats. We look at the recent history of this issue, some extreme cases, the ten “most gerrymandered states” and its contribution to our hyper-partisanship. This will be a modification and update of the original presentation.

## **The Second Amendment, Gun Rights, and the NRA**

The Second Amendment to the Constitution protects “the right of the people to keep and bear arms.” How and why did the writers of the Constitution think this right was so important, and what changes and developments in the gun rights issue, and efforts at gun control, have evolved throughout U.S. history? As the National Rifle Association has become such an active player in the gun control debate, how did this organization come into existence, what was its original purpose, and how has it changed?

## **The Trump Phenomenon: Why He Might Win**

Bombastic, reality TV celebrity Donald Trump burst into the presidential election, upending politics as usual. Now this unlikely contender might well become the next President of the United States. How did this happen? Who or what is responsible? Who are Trump's supporters? What does the Trump Phenomenon tell us about America today? Many questions; some answers; much angst.

## Is Capitalism Sustainable?

The earth is finite and inextensible. Capitalism, in contrast, is an economic system that depends on continuous growth and utilization of natural resources. These perspectives are in conflict, and result in degradation of the earth by resource depletion, climate change, and population increases.

The presentation will examine how this conflict is playing out today. Is free-market capitalism supportable? Does it increase inequality? Can it be sufficiently regulated to be sustainable? And why do people deny the evidence and implications of climate change?

### Part 1 – **The Americans Come to France and John dos Passos, *Three Soldiers***

I created this PowerPoint presentation around 2007 for a seminar entitled The Literature of World War I. My father fought in the American sector in WW1, and in the late 70's, when we were living in Brussels, my family and I took a tour of the American sector based on a description of my father's experiences he wrote 65 years after "The Great War" had ended. I chose to report on the book *Three Soldiers* by John dos Passos, to help me re-connect with my father. The PowerPoint is a blend of the overall history of the War, our 1970's tour, and some musical interludes. It was one of the first offerings of the Encore series, and runs like a YouTube video. WARNING: It is about WAR!

### Part 2 – **The WW1 Military Service—or Not—of Our Forebears**

Drawing on her family research in family and government records for the Finding Family Interest Group, Bobbie will describe the workings of the WWI draft system in the U.S., the first modern one for the country, and Kay will describe how her West Virginian ancestors who served in WW1 came home to the flu pandemic, and how that pandemic affected the war and those at home.

Who was this original and, at times, wildly popular artist, a put-on? How far could he take the gag?

**The World's Columbian Exposition of 1893 and its Remarkable Ferris Wheel**

A World's Fair was held in Chicago in 1893, in honor of the 400th anniversary of the Discovery of America by Columbus. 200 new buildings, dubbed "the White City," were designed by leading architects from across the country; fortunately many photos survive. An enormous wheel, designed by George Washington Gale Ferris, was a big attraction. The Exposition drew 27.5 million visitors at a time when the entire population of the United States was 65 million. Through this presentation, we will travel back in time to the Gilded Age for a virtual tour.

**Big Band Era**

The Big Bands of the 1920s through the 1950s were a major source of entertainment in the United States. The development of coast-to-coast radio coverage enabled Americans to become familiar with these bands and to dance to their music in various ballrooms and hotels throughout the United States.
